Christian Aid is the official agency of 40 Church denominations in the U.K. supporting development work in 60 countries worldwide to enable poor communities to help themselves. Christian Aid works with partner organisations rather than Governments, in locally based projects, which may for example:

- Help people by providing seeds and tools so that families can recover after natural disasters and start to grow enough to eat.
- Building new wells and testing existing ones to ensure adequate supplies of safe, clean water.
- Provide small loans to enable local people to start a business.

Christian Aid provides extensive worship material around CHRISTIAN AID WEEK in May each year and for HARVEST and CHRISTMAS, which includes:

- ideas for your adult congregation,
- activities for all-age worship,
- children's education materials suitable for schools and Sunday School activities,
- themed fund raising suggestions.
